Catherine Tansey Ursula Leitzman Beverly Zimmerman It was my great pleasure to be the keynote speaker at the SIETAR Japan conference at the end of June. The relationship between the Japan and USA chapters of SIETAR is very strong and it was a joy to be with conference participants in Tokyo and to meet with their leadership group. The opening keynote address will be in the next issue of the SIETAR Japan journal. The central message of that presentation was the importance of our work as interculturalists and how research demonstrates that programs devoted to increasing understanding between culture groups have a positive impact.

Drawing on Lee Knefelkamp and John E. Mack's work, I explored the prevalence of dualism in the world and the difference between naïve (Knefelkamp)/primitive (Mack) dualism and pernicious dualism. Interculturalists can draw on their own experience with naïve/primitive dualism, which tends to occur when knowledge is limited, to comprehend a reliance on the either/or approach to any complex issue. All of us have had the experience of naïve dualism and this provides some insight into how the mind deals with difference, of its tendency to create enemies especially when there is a sense of threat. Pernicious dualism is a greatly exaggerated and destructive form of dualism, one we do not often experience in the class and training room but we encounter it in other places. Insight into our own dualistic background informs our ability to help others accept an intercultural approach to looking at the world and to dealing with differences. It also helps us identify pernicious dualism and to know when we must work against this insidious undermining of respect for and acceptance of those who are unlike ourselves.

I look forward to seeing many of you at our gathering in Austin, Texas.
